


Q2 How did you rate the speakers?



Another excellent line up of panel members and speakers.

Unfortunately had to leave before I heard Francesca, the lunch could have been shorter with an earlier finish time.

This is the first and not last time I attend this conference and if I'm really honest.... it was the BEST conference I have attended in all of my professional working life.

My first venture and opportunity to attend a BASE conference before even attending any regional BASE meetings. I didn't know what to expect but found it enjoyable, informing, motivating - the chance to meet other across the entire UK working in similar roles with similar challenges. The venue location and facilities, food and hospitality, workshops and guest speaker, dinner and awards were well managed, a full schedule and the 2-days flew by. In hindsight, I may have possibly picked one or two workshop changes, not quite knowing what to expect and whether the discussions within the workshops had direct impact on my own work.

Would like to have a disability MP there to answer questions and listen to us professionals about the struggles this government are making for disabled people.

The discussion panel, I found very difficult to understand - some of the abbreviations I did not understand. I did like the talk from Keith regarding his personal experience and was very pleased that they won an award.

Keith XPO and James and Maurice were highlights by far.

I could only attend the first day so didn't get to see speakers in the Wednesday.

Had to leave early on day 2 - apologies. Day one speakers were outstanding overall, I thought.

A great range of speakers from different sectors. All were interesting to listen to and cumulatively they recharged our enthusiasm for Supported Employment.

Good range of speakers inspiration and thought provoking.

For the most part excellent and illuminating speakers.

I was unable to attend the Wednesday afternoon session but was impressed with the range of speakers and variety of topics. All relevant to current industry issues / challenges.

The speakers at the start of the conference were encouraging and it was reassuring to see how well they were working with our providers.

I particularly enjoyed the film clips of people achieving in their environments.

Francesca Martinez is an articulate inspiring individual and she brought the whole conference to a wonderful close, looking at changing perspectives and forcing people to think outwith the BOX. We are all DIFFERENT and DISABLED but we don't use the word DISABLED to describe typical individuals. Different is positive and enlightening as is wobbly!!!!

We left at lunchtime on Day 2 so unable to comment on Day 2 speakers.

A really good combination of local and national experts, displaying expertise in "how it's done" or very sound and up-to-date policy knowledge and understanding. I felt very well informed. It would be great to have the links to the videos shown by the speakers - they were very powerful.

I thought Keith was brilliant- he discussed things in a basic way and I felt fully engaged with their journey. I found the panel a tad confusing and at one point was convinced people were talking about IBS... but that's just me!!

Had to return to work on day as found out we had an imminent Ofsted inspection!

Really great conference and learnt a lot. Well done to all concerned.

As shown above, everyone was excellent without exception. For me, a few stood out even further: Francesca delivered such a perfect show - part comedy, part honesty, and a whole lot of genuine truth. 
Was disappointed to miss Francesca. Please can we be acronym free.

Q3 How did you rate the workshops?



I really enjoyed all the workshops I took part in. A3 was brilliant and a great way forward to regulate our work. My knowledge on supported business is not great, hence why I went to the workshop. Sadly I'm still confused as to how and where these will work. However, it's a space I will watch.

Access to Work seemed to send representative from wrong departments. The reps didn't know much more than what we already know so took back lots of queries.

I found the sessions where they encouraged group activities to be most useful as it started up conversations and encouraged new ideas to be shared. Some sessions were encouraging sales of services or products this was less useful.

Excellent choice and mix of workshops with excellent learning points and sharing and promoting good practice

ATW did not have opportunities to answer questions and were too vague. Reflections on TSI was interesting however felt like it was more about recruiting trainers. Future proofing supported businesses was interesting. It was mentioned on repeated occasions about joining up funding. Closing the disability employment gap- was interesting. I found talking with the other providers in the room great.

Did not attend all workshops, and no option to add that?

I really enjoyed the workshops I attended. They were informative, interactive and fun.

TSI workshop focused more on the careers of the trainers and reflections of their careers and did not do enough to emphasise the power of the model. Focused on the delivery and history in America too much and not enough emphasis on how TSI is being effective in this country. Accessible employment was

relevant to my role and the group work allowed for good practice to be shared. Very effective Raising Aspirations for people with LD very inspiring. Trainers were down to earth, humorous and bounced off each other. Best double act of the conference!

D1 was the best seminar I have been to in a long time. It was very informative, whilst drawing on real life case studies and showed the excellent work being done in Northamptonshire whilst also sharing ideas that we can implement in other areas.

Good variety of speakers and workshops.

A shame to have to miss so much interesting stuff - I suppose the solution is to bring a colleague next year.

All of the speakers and workshops were fantastic. I really enjoyed and got a lot from the conference.

I loved the Raising Aspirations session...great presentation and great speakers!

I didn't feel that A5: Alternative Funding: thinking out of the box (Pembrokeshire CC) delivered on the title of the workshop. It was interesting to hear about the great work they are doing but there were no real suggestions. Maybe it was only meant for local authorities?

The presentations are all delivered to the highest of standards and time is always given to discuss and evaluate content. Delivered by passionate well-informed individuals.

B4: Empowering communication in SEND transitions (Books Beyond Words) - This workshop felt like it was just selling its books. I thought it would be more theory and practice around communication in SEND Transition.

The air conditioner in the room was noisy and made it difficult to hear the speaker in workshop C4 and D4.

All experts in the field. I connected well with workshop delegates from many different backgrounds and didn't assume much prior knowledge. I was afraid the workshops were going to be only employer-focused but that was not the case.

I felt the Brain in Hand was good - it was definitely an area we'd like to explore. There wasn't a discussion around price so not really sure if it is an option. Books Beyond Words was really good - potentially because it was about the individual. I thought of a million book titles during the workshop. Worked with a lovely man through the workshop, which was lovely as I kept seeing him throughout the 2 days.

I found workshop B5 particularly interesting as I have been considering setting up a similar group in Pembrokeshire. Not only were the speaker inspiring, but they gave a great insight into how this was done by them and ideas on how I could set this up. It was great to discuss this with other delegates who have initiated this or who are thinking of setting up a similar group. The speakers from Triangle Consulting (and also Liverpool LA), were very helpful and it was great to have a discussion with them following their workshop as we currently use the Work Star but have found that this is not appropriate for everyone we support. The Pathway Star seems more accessible for some of our participants.

Difficult to hear in some workshops due to lots of noise next door, the names of the rooms were confusing as very similar to each other so not very sensory friendly.

Great choice of workshops, too many to choose from!

Again, each workshop I attended provided me with a wealth of information and ideas - some aspects gave me confidence that I am well on track and in the right direction (my programme is still young and in development), and some provided valuable ideas to build into development and progression.

D5 although interesting didn't quite hit the mark as a workshop. Felt like they were trying to get something from attendees (funding, members, marketing ideas) so the balance was off. Maybe a stall would be more appropriate. A2 was very interesting and will change my practice as a job coach. Excited to feed back this

approach to self-employment to my colleagues. B2 was helpful for me as someone who already uses Systematic Instruction



On account of not booking I don't know!


Would have been good to get the programme details a bit earlier so my colleague and I could decide which workshops to attend

No issues at all.


A colleague was originally registered. However, it was easy enough to change her name to mine on the delegate list.

The food was disappointing compared to the lunches.


This is a hard one as the awards and the evening were great but the food was very average.

Q11 How would you rate the conference overall?

I would love to see employers attend who thinking about supported employment. For them to see there really is support out there and its not risky, or a HR headache and speak to others how have employed people and talk to us. i think, when you see supported employment as a group/countywide approach, it becomes less of a risk and more of "how can we get involved."

Coming from Jersey, we are fortunate to not have the same difficulties with funding that apply to many of the services in the UK. Understandably this dominates a lot of the discussion at events such as this but as my first BASE conference since starting in this field only 3 months ago, I found it was very top heavy with discussions of a financial nature. I would have enjoyed the pleasure of learning more about the different services and approaches in operation across the UK.

Address and contact details of venue on programme value for money venue.

Different hotel, I was on the top floor and my key card continually did not work. I was having to wait a long time to be able to catch the lift back down to sort this out which was quite frustrating.

The Q&A times there were a lot of questions and not as much time. I wonder if a people could write down additional questions, then after theses are answered share will all electronically?

Invite a 'work and health programme' provider to gain their perspective on supported employment. More NHS providers who deliver IPS to secondary mental health patient referrals.

Disability minsters, businesses wanting to find out more.....

Maybe over 1 day.

Some of the workshops seemed to be more like the provider selling their product rather than actually shearing best practice or meaningful knowledge.

Maybe a form which has the abbreviations written down in the welcome packs on the tables, so I can relate to what people are talking about. This I did struggle on.

At times too much jargon from some of the speakers, some of the subjects subject matter was not as relevant to my role so keeping up the jargon was much more challenging.

I would like the option of evening only tickets, so we can invite more of our team to join in with the awards and dinner as a celebration of what we are doing. We couldn't afford to have more to the whole

conference, but we would have liked more people to come just for the evening. This may also boost some income for BASE, as teams who have been nominated for awards would most likely want to bring more people to celebrate with them. I would have liked to see more clients/advocates/experts by experience as speakers. I would have liked to hear their first hand experiences and how supported employment has impacted on their lives. It would be good to have more of a celebration of our clients. Even if this was by pre-recorded video, if it wasn't feasible for any clients to attend. I would have liked to see more employers, maybe a mini employer engagement event could be set up in one of the seminar slots. If we invited national companies, who have locations all over, we could engage with them and perhaps offer our clients case studies to them for prospective employment. it would also be a way to educate and inform employers. Would like some of the more popular seminars to be repeated so there was an opportunity to attend if they clashed with another seminar that was also of interest.

I would like workshops to be more interactive. As I couldn't attend the dinner I would've liked more networking opportunities. I would like to hear more from people with lived experience.

As a lot of people tend to leave early on the second day due to travel arrangements, I wonder if it would be worth starting the second day earlier (as most attendees are staying locally) and ending the day at midday. So you get maximum attendance, but allow for those with long journeys in front of them.

I think it would have been nice to have a marketplace, there were only a couple of stands and I think that having a marketplace is a great way for people to network and gain valuable information about services.

When we booked the workshop we weren't initially told that there was also an exhibition table.

A civilised temperature in the main hall! That is really the only change I would make.

Just a thought but if you are looking to increase numbers it might be worth trying to market at employers more (you could do this through member links) - make workshops targeted at warm lead employers - even if this was just one day of the conference it might be a good angle? Different target markets over the two days - discount if you come for both days?

Next time would be good to see more diversity at the conference if possible. The decision to read out Aaron's (XPO employee) words when XPO won an award was frustrating, as he was confident with speaking, and no other award winners had their words read out. This was patronising and went against the ethos of the entire conference.

Not able to see all content on the screen in the main hall. Panel members at the table on the stage were clearly self-conscious at times as people tried to see around them. Even when they weren't there, all of the information wasn't visible. Lack of wifi and aircon were disappointing. A shorter lunch break on Day 2 and a slightly earlier finish might have allowed more people to stay for Francesca's slot. Partitioned workshop rooms on the third floor meant that noise levels carried. I had to move from the back row to front row of B5 (Victoria Park) as I couldn't hear the presentation because of the noise from the next room.

Maybe a bit of an improvement on the autism access generally. For instance I recommend taking a look at some of the techniques that Autscope use such as interaction badges and a sensory/quiet room. Also the conference could have a sort of ice-breaking session/ designated/networking session) particularly for people who are either less skilled in networking or who are attending BASE conference for their first time.

Nothing!

More information beforehand, easier to find.

Candidates who are or have been supported into work given a slot to talk about their journey /experience.

More about mental health.

Less time for lunch breaks and an earlier finish.

A couple of workshops for people that are new or that are not familiar with supported employment. I found the "Back to Basics: the 5 stages of Supported Employment (BASE)" workshop, really useful and according to my need.

More networking opportunities built in - maybe something where half the hall stay put on a table and the other half move around the tables in set time intervals? This would be great on the first morning.

I wouldn't change a thing. You did it perfectly.

It's a shame that we had to choose between so many great workshops per session. Perhaps next time there could be more workshops throughout the day so people can attend more and don't miss out.

ATW 'session' as part of the conference instead as a workshop to avoid competition for other workshops and ensure everybody can attend this session??

This again, is down to my own limitations- but there were a lot of acronyms and I kept scribbling away to try and find out what they meant.

I didn't enjoy the discussion panel but I think this is because of the role I am in I don't really have to deal with Commissioning & Funding of Supported Employment. This would be more managers and senior positions. Maybe there could be something else in another room for anyone who is an employment support officer or lower grade with something more relevant

Not sure at the moment.
